BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

The voters of the Town of Amherst elect four members of the Board at large and the Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts appoints one member. All members serve five-year terms. The members establish policies regulating the operation of the Amherst Housing Authority. Regular Board meetings are held on the fourth Monday in the community room at Ann Whalen Apartments or in the community room at Jean Elder House. In April, Paul Bobrowski was elected to a 5 year term. Peter Jessop is the Authority's appointee to the Town's Community Preservation Act committee.

At their annual meeting in April, Peter Jessop was elected Chair, Jean Haggerty Vice Chair, Paul Bobrowski Treasurer, and Constance Kruger Assistant Treasurer.

AMHERST HOUSING AUTHORITY HIGHLIGHTS

During the past year, the AHA received three funding awards totaling \$1,363,846.00 to renovate 22 units of scattered site family housing. The funding awards include \$363,846.00 from the CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) program, \$350,00.00 from the Town's CPA (Community Preservation Act) and a matching grant of \$650,000.00 from DHCD (Department of Housing and Community Development. The Authority has contracted design services with Hill Engineers, Architects, and Planners.

In efforts to reduce energy costs, the Authority replaced boilers with high efficiency and energy saving models in 10 units at Watson Farms Apartments (funded through the Town's CDBG Program) and 21 units at the 705 scattered site family housing (funded by DHCD). In addition, the windows on Sunrise Avenue were replaced using operating reserve funds.

The Authority approved a management agreement with Pomeroy Lane Cooperative with an April 1, 2011 effective date. The Authority also extended its current management agreement with Valley Main Street LLC.

DHCD has allocated \$662,254.00 to the Authority for capital improvements at the state-aided housing developments. The Authority received \$25,673.00 from the HUD (Housing and Urban Development) for various improvements at Watson Farms Apartments.

The AHA continues to improve its existing management, maintenance, and rental assistance programs and to emphasize preventative maintenance.

AMHERST HOUSING AUTHORITY STAFF

In addition to the actual day-to-day management, maintenance, and administration of the Authority's programs, the AHA staff provides information to the general public and to local and state agencies and boards.

Maintenance/Capital Improvements

The maintenance staff prepared 19 vacancies for occupancy and completed 854 work orders. The staff also maintains the grounds and buildings at the Authority's fourteen properties.

Management

The Authority maintained 6 waiting lists and processed 693 new applications during the year for a total of 1202 households awaiting assistance. AHA staff processed 182 income recertifications, signed leases with 19 new households residing in AHA owned property and conducted 195 unit inspections.

The Authority approved a no smoking policy for all of the

Authority's properties. In addition, the Board approved a Language Access Plan, a new rent collection and applicant screening policy, and revised policies for the Section 8 and Watson Farms retroactive rents and repayment agreements.

Rental Assistance Programs

The AHA administers four rental assistance programs: the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program (MRVP), the Alternative Housing Voucher Program (AHVP, and the Department of Mental Health Subsidy Program all funded by the Department of Housing and Community Development. All of these programs permit eligible households to occupy privately owned units. The Authority pays part of the monthly rent directly to the owner. Over 120 local owners participate in the programs.

AHA staff issued 19 Section 8 Housing Choice vouchers, completed 856 income recertifications and leased 35 new families on the program. The Authority also completed 7 MRVP and AHVP income recertifications. Because of a serious funding shortfall over the past year, the AHA was forced to reduce the payment standards for the Section 8 Program and to suspend vouchers for a number of families that were searching for housing.

382 housing inspections were completed during the year. These inspections included annual, move- in, and special inspections of units leased through the Section 8 and conventional housing programs.

The Authority received a 100% high performer rating by HUD for the Section 8 Management Assistance Program.

Resident Services

The Support Service Program, through its Coordinator, arranges for counseling, individual assessments, support, and crisis intervention to elderly/handicapped residents. The program also provides a number of educational forums for residents.

Ann Whalen Wellness Program received funding from Highland Valley Elder Services (\$5250.00) and from the Amherst Club (\$500.00). This funding allows the Wellness Program to continue with a program administered in collaboration with the nursing department at the University of Massachusetts and to sponsor a healthy breakfast for residents of Ann Whalen. A number of new programs were started this year including Over Eaters Anonymous, massage therapy, yoga and strength training, a matter of balance, and Wednesday evening movie night. The Authority appreciates the efforts of Clemencia Robles and Kathleen Fisher who are involved with the Senior Community Services Program and provide a wide variety of services and programs to the AHA and to tenants. The Authority appreciates those who volunteer in the office; they are Barbara Renault, Barbara Crossman, Idris Ahmed, Eleanor Mieloszyk, and Colette Foster.

A number of tenants at Chestnut Court and Ann Whalen Apartments are very active in gardening. They have provided many hours of labor enhancing the landscape with flowers and shrubs at both developments.
